Lavatera assurgentiflora Island or Tree Mallow (Malva Rosa)

LARGE SHRUB, SMALL TREE evergreen.

10 - 15' high, equal spread.
Loose, open branching.
Large, maple-like leaves.
Bright lavender to rose-pink
'hibiscus-like' flowers March to November, with
peak bloom in mid-summer.

Native habitat: sandy flats and rocky places - Channel Islands.

Full sun.

Tolerates wind and salt spray.

Considered drought tolerant along coast, but needs summer water (1 - 2 x / month) in hot places.

Grows rapidly. Fast screen.
Provides spectacular addition to garden.
Can prune or cut back for denser foliage
or hedge-like growth.
