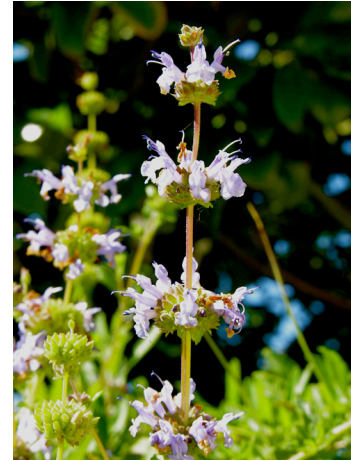


Salvia munzii

Munz's Sage, San Miguel Sage

WOODY SUBSHRUB - can be semi-deciduous in drought.
2 to 3' high, 3' spread. Compact.
Dark green, wrinkled, aromatic leaves.
Clear blue flowers - spring, summer.

Native habitat: coastal sage scrub, under 2000' - San Miguel
Mountain, adjacent Baja California (very limited).

Full sun. Frost resistant. Tolerates heavy soil.
Drought tolerant, but can use some summer water (1 x/month).

Good for small gardens, perennial borders. Best if tip pruned continually.
Attracts hummingbirds and butterflies.

Should not be planted near wildlands outside its range to prevent hybridization
with other *Salvias*. Consult with one of our plant experts before selecting this
species.
