NOTE TO READERS—This is the first second draft of a strategic plan for the San Diego Chapter of the CNPS. It follows the format of the recently adopted statewide CNPS strategic plan. This document is the basis for developing the Chapter plan and eventually a more specific implementation plan and schedule to guide the Chapter members and their representatives in everyday activities and important Chapter decisions for the next 10 years. It is anticipated that the plan can be updated as needed.

CNPS MISSION

The mission of the California Native Plant Society is to conserve California native plants and their natural habitats, and increase understanding, appreciation, and horticultural use of native plants. [State CNPS]

CNPSSD MISSION:

The Mission of the San Diego Chapter of the CNPS is to conserve San Diego <u>and Imperial</u> County native plants and their natural habitats, and <u>to</u> increase <u>everyone's</u> understanding, appreciation, and horticultural use of native plants.

CNPSSD Vision

CNPSSD envisions a future where:

- There is successful and continuing conservation of the <u>full</u> diversity of native plants and native vegetation in the San Diego <u>and Imperial County</u> region.
- The San Diego Chapter of the CNPSSD is recognized as a leader in for providing reliable information on California native plants and their conservation.
- Native plants are widely used in the home, <u>commercial</u>, and <u>public</u> and in <u>commercial</u> landscapes horticultural endeavors are recognized as an alternative to <u>water-consuming</u> <u>plants</u> species that we completely

 There is <u>widespread</u> increased public education on the values and aesthetics native plants and native vegetation in the San Diego <u>and Imperial counties</u> Region.

Elected officials and agency decision makers are aware of the effects of their

actions and on the unique environmental resources in San Diego and Imperial Counties. County.

GOAL 1 Provide scientific information as the basis for the protection of native plants, <u>native vegetation</u> plant communities, and <u>natural</u> landscapes.

Strategy 1: "Understand the flora"

To improve scientific understanding of the native plants and native vegetation in San Diego and Imperial counties, including taxonomy, floristics, ecology, and life history, we will establish a knowledge base, including a bibliography and library that will serve as a current source of scientific data for members on the San Diego County plants and plant communities, including taxonomy, floristies, ecology, life history, etc.

This information should focus on access to contemporary scientific information, including published documents, regional reports and local data. We should identify other available information sources such as mapping, and specimen collections.

Strategy 2: "Assess and prioritize"

On an initial annual and twice per year bases, we will analyze acquired data to identify and prioritize conservation targets, including plant species (and their habitats) and regionally sustainable habitat conservation that is consistent with these conservation targets.

Strategy 3: Engage in regular scientific dialogs and meetings that gather and disseminate information concerning the status and protection of native plants, native vegetation, plant communities and landscapes.

We should try to sponsor or cosponsor workshops concerning these subjects on an annual or every other schedule.

GOAL 2 Protect native plants and plant communities through effective and coordinated conservation action

Strategy 1:

Conservation of California's plants and plant communities requires several key resources: a strong legal framework to give us power to effect change; effective volunteers staff to act and coordinate action dedicated partners to support our efforts; and a region-wide statewide network of committed activists. Improving any of these can make us more effective –improving all of them can save the flora. [From CNPS state.]

Strategy 1 2: "Strengthen the power of the law"

We will build, strengthen, and maintain a robust legal and regulatory framework that the Chapter CNPS and partners use to protect native plants. [CNPS state]

The Conservation Chair may prepare letters on CNPS Letterhead provided that the Chapter President and when possible the entire Board is given the opportunity to review the letters in advance through distributing the letter to the President and when possible the entire Board by E mail. The President should be provided three days for review. If the President has concerns with the letter as written, they will communicate with the Conservation Chair by Email or direct contact to resolve the concern. If the members of the Board also have comments or concerns, they too may communicate with the Conservation Chair to resolve the concern. If the concern appears not to be resolvable through E mail or direct contact, the matter will be placed on the agenda for OUI-custon co the next Board meeting. In some cases which are considered to be urgent by the President, the discussion points may be provided by E mail to the Board members by the Conservation Chair and The concerned Board member and a vote may be taken by sending an E mail to the President. in order to meet comment deadlings,

which will more than likely result in no comment letter leng sent by CNPSSD it comment deadlines are not met.
