The sale is open to members at 9:15am and to the general public at 10am. It's easy to become a member at the sale and get in early for the best selection! You can also check out the bulbs, seeds, books and other goodies available for purchase at the sale.

Native plant experts will be on hand to help shoppers select plants, and answer questions about native plant gardening.

Once you've found the plants you want, gather up your order and proceed to the checkout area on the front lawn. There will be some carts available to help shoppers but **please bring your own garden cart or little red wagon.**

At checkout, a ticket writer will write up your order, give you a ticket to take to the cashier, and hold your purchase until you return with a ticket stamped SOLD, indicating you've paid for your purchase and are good to go.

We will have a loading area by the curb so that you can pull up your vehicle, load up your plants, and take them off to their new home! Please come on by and support us in the biggest fundraising event of the year for our chapter!



Tim Cass has been busy growing the seedlings for fall planting. Optional carcamp afterwards. Sunday we'll have several hikes in the area, possibly Sombrero peak, or the palm grove in 4 Frogs Canyon. This is also a critical area of concern about the potential for a wind farm in the valley.

Laguna Hansen, Baja California October 7-8

Andrew Pigniolo will lead us through a variety of plant habitats on our way to the Laguna Hansen area in Baja's Sierra Juarez where we will camp in mixed conifer forest at 5000 feet. If we're lucky, we'll see lots of fall flowers due to the summer rains; we will definitely see lots of Baja perennials and species with limited distribution in San Diego County.

This is an overnight camping trip; bring everything you need for self-sufficient camping including water and food. Hopefully we will catch beautiful fall weather, but be prepared for cold nights.

Passport and Mexican insurance are necessary. We will be traveling on dirt roads; please contact Dave Flietner (see back page) by <u>Wednesday</u>, <u>October 4</u> to confirm attendance and arrange travel / camping details. Field trip is limited to CNPS members only.
